Letter to the Parish from Fr Darren on spending time with God in silence

Bored, bored bored! I'm really bored! I wish I had a pound for every time that I said this to my parents, normally within ten minutes of the summer holiday starting, or within five minutes of setting out on the car journey to the coast.

I was one of those annoying children who had a very low boredom threshold. I needed to be doing something, not sitting down navel gazing. I suppose I was a creature of my upbringing. Sitting and being was a sign of laziness, and in my family, laziness was not allowed. 'If you are bored, get off of your backside and do something productive' would be the response to 'I'm bored'.

On a recent diocesan youth pilgrimage to Taize, a Christian community in France one of the Brothers, Brother Paolo, spoke about the gift of being bored. How being bored should be seen as God sent, and a time to sit and be, instead of a situation to be filled with activity.

To me this was crazy talk! Who in their right mind would want to be bored, to sit with nothing to do! God gave me a smart phone, an iPad and a community to minister to, to make sure I was never bored. So how can boredom be good? How can it be beneficial to me?

Brother Paolo also said that boredom should be seen as a time to sit with God and be still. To use it as a opportunity to wait on God, to be still, to dwell in his presence. Not a time of prayer, but a time to be present with God. You sitting with God, God sitting with you, and just being pleased to be in each other's company. No words spoken, just being. He also said that this would take practice, and we would need to fight to desire to do stuff. In my case to be productive.

So, my big question to you is, are you up for being bored? Are you up for sitting quietly with God, and doing nothing?

I challenge you, join me in taking a few moments each day to be bored, unproductive, and sit. It may be hard, but no time spent sitting with God is ever wasted.

Sílence and love

Christ says: "This is my commandment, that you love one another as I have loved you" (John 15:12). We need silence in order to welcome these words and put them into practice.

When we are agitated and restless, we have so many arguments and reasons not to forgive and not to love too easily. But when we "have calmed and quieted our soul", these reasons turn out to be quite insignificant.

Maybe we sometimes avoid silence, preferring whatever noise, words or distraction, because inner peace is a risky thing: it makes us empty and poor, disintegrates bitterness and leads us to the gift of ourselves. Silent and poor, our hearts are overwhelmed by the Holy Spirit, filled with an unconditional love.

Silence is a humble yet secure path to loving.





Bike N Hike 8th September 2018

It happens every year, but what is Bike n Hike all about? Below are some questions and answers on the subject.

Q. Who runs the Bike 'n Hike event?

A. An organisation called Beds & Herts Historic Churches Trust (B&HHCT) who raise funds to help churches in Beds & Herts with essential finances. They have supported St Eth's on two occasions in the past with financial donations. We are hoping that they might support us further with funding for the West End project and feel it is important that, we in turn, support their work.

Q. How does Bike 'n Hike work?

A. We have lists of participating churches in Beds & Herts and the idea is for people to get friends and family to sponsor them for each church they visit, much like a sponsored walk. Traditionally the visit takes place on a bike, or by foot, but we understand the rules have relaxed and a visit by car is also now acceptable – as long as you sign the B&HHCT register which each participating church will have. The money raised through sponsorship, is split 50/50 with half going directly to B&HHCT, and half to a church of your choice (hopefully St Eth's with St Luke's).

Q. How can I help by participating in Bike 'n Hike?

There are two main ways for you to support this cause:

- 1. By getting people you know to sponsor you to visit a range of churches in Beds & Herts.
- 2. By helping out on the day welcoming Bike 'n Hike visitors to St Eth's & St Luke's.

Q. Can I visit any churches I like – or is there a plan I must stick to?

A. The sponsored visits to participating churches are entirely your choice and do not have to be local, much will depend on whether you are travelling by foot, bike or car.

The Great War — Hatfield Roll of Honour — WW1 1914—1918

Remembering those WW1 soldiers from Hatfield who died in service to their country in September

There were a great many losses for Hatfield during the month of September throughout WW1, but in particular in September 1916, when the Battle of the Somme raged. Commencing on 1st July 1916 and ending on 18th November 1916. The Battle of the Somme was one of the defining events of WW1, resulting in over one million casualties.

On a lighter note, church bells rang out spontaneously around the country on the 11th November 1918 to celebrate news of the signing of the armistice, marking the end of the most catastrophic war the world had yet seen. However, amongst the losses were 1400 bell ringers—including one of ours, Rupert Edward Gascoyne Cecil. The Central Council of Church Bell Ringers have now launched a campaign to recruit 1400 new bell ringers to ring in their honour on 11th November 2018—could you be one of those? 

Music at St Eth's—Jill Knight, Director of Music

I am writing this article on the west coast of Ireland on a sunny but blustery day, after a wonderful walk on Valentia Island to one of the most westerly points in Europe; from Bray Head, you can see two jagged rocks 12 miles out to sea – The Skelligs. Star Wars fans may recognise them as featuring in the latest Star Wars films. However, way before then, Skellig Michael was the site of a very early Christian monastery where the monks worshipped God, in a beautiful, but at times very harsh environment. It is inspirational in its remoteness, beauty and tranquillity – and helps me as I look ahead to prepare the music at St Eth's for Harvest, the Burghley Sermon, Remembrance, Advent and Christmas.

Both our junior and adult choirs have taken a break over the summer but will start again in September. The first rehearsal for the **adults** is on **Wednesday 29th August at 7.30pm** and **Y.E.S!** are starting the term with a **training morning on Monday 3rd September**, followed by an activity afternoon at Phasels Wood. On Pentecost Sunday we appointed



Catriona Stewart as our first Head Chorister for Y.E.S! and Lewis Gower and Cheryl Jeyakumar as Deputy Head Choristers. These positions of responsibility within our Junior Choir will be held for one year and give our young people an opportunity to demonstrate their organisational, caring and leadership skills within Y.E.S! and our Christian family.

Tail End.....news from the bell ringers—1400 bell ringers required...

...to commemorate the 1400 bell ringers who died in the First World War, the Central Council of Church Bell Ringers have launched a campaign to recruit 1400 new bell ringers. This is a call out to all of us and an opportunity for everyone, a chance to make this wonderful ancient tradition open to all.

When the bells rang out on the 11th November 1918 they announced the end of the most catastrophic war the world had yet seen. 100 years ago we had eight bells in the tower – unfortunately, we don't have any records as to who rang the bells on 11/11/18. In 1929, two trebles were added in memory of Rupert Edward Gascoyne Cecil, one of our bell ringers, who lost his life at Ypres in 1915.

On 11th November 2018, St Etheldreda's bell ringers will endeavour to ring all of our ten bells to commemorate

the occasion. Those of you who live close to the tower will hear only six bells ringing on Sunday mornings and Thursday evenings because we don't yet have enough experienced ringers to ring all ten bells.

The campaign to recruit 1400 bell ringers was mentioned in The House of Commons in June and in Radio 4's 'Archers' programme in July. David Malpas (an avid Archers fan) listened to the episode about "the 1400" and contacted us with a view to learn to ring. He is making good progress and we hope he will be a valued member of the band for Armistice Day this year.
